International art award for Milbourne Lodge

Milbourne Lodge School in the UK triumphed amid some 4,000 entries to win the Michael O'Mara Books Personal Choice Award at the recent Global Canvas Schools Art Competition Finals 2018. Held at the Natural History Museum in London, the global exhibition featured 15 shortlisted schools.

A group of 10 pupils helped build the exhibition at the museum and they accepted the trophy on behalf of the whole school. Milbourne's submission combines the pupils' creativity in Art and IT to illustrate the importance of protecting individual natural habitats for all endangered species. No animal is depicted without illustrating their own natural environment.

In IT, the pupils 3D-scanned the sculptures they had created in Art and these models were used as part of an AR (Augmented Reality) project which pupils designed and built.

North Bridge House Senior launches 'Pride and Diversity Council'

North Bridge House Senior School, Hampstead in the UK is promoting openness, diversity and inclusiveness through its new 'Pride and Diversity Council'. Its first meeting was held on 1st February – aptly timed to coincide with the start of LGBT history month – and the Council's founding teachers, Katharine Harney and Ellis Bolle, were overwhelmed with the forty-strong attendance.

Inspired by Cognita's <u>Stonewall</u> training last November, Katherine and Ellis were inspired to take some of these ideas back to school. The duo bravely attended all year group assemblies and pitched the idea of the council to NBH Senior students, emphasising that the council is open to all students, however they identify.

The new council has already made a big impact at the school and have held sessions and workshops on issues that affect LGBTQ students. They have also committed to celebrate LGBTQ culture and history throughout the year, taking part in both the LGBTQ History Month and Pride during the Summer Term.

Katherine Harney, one of the Council's founding teachers, says: "The strongest support, I think, has come from students who identify as 'allies'. Encouraging all students, especially those who do not identify as LGBTQ, to think, listen, care and become allies is work that all schools – Cognita or otherwise – can do."



BSB hosts Children's Lit Quiz for Barcelona

The British School of Barcelona Castelldefels hosted the city's international schools for a Children's Literature Quiz last month. 52 eager literary buffs across Key Stage 3 shared and celebrated their love of reading and literature.
